As much of our community emerges from the pandemic, we are pleased that StepUp Durham's work has continued to thrive. We finished the fiscal year with our strongest average wage ever! We were able to honor our commitment to serving holistically by connecting 23 individuals to mental health services through our newly launched partnership with Darkness Rising and Stand Up Speak Out. And, we became one of two national guaranteed income pilots in the country providing support to formerly incarcerated individuals, allowing us to serve our largest number of individuals in a year since opening our doors in 2015.

Interestingly, when you turn the number eight on its side, it is the symbol of infinity. I hope as you review our work from last fiscal year, you want to continue to be part of the infinite possibilities.

## Wyatt

( Balancing work, life and the program were a challenge, but I made it happen. )

In 2016, Wyatt's mother introduced her to StepUp. Step2 helped her recall things she already knew but should be practicing, like financial strategies. She moved from Georgia, leaving an eight-year abusive relationship. She was just starting over. Wyatt's goal is to use her creativity and be paid for it. She is taking a music production class through Elevate.

"I just want to be happy, and I want the work I do to be fulfilling. I want to get up and love it. With the pandemic, it has opened my eyes and I am sure a lot of other people's eyes that life is extremely short. You have to have that work life balance. If you are tired all the time from working, how are you going to accomplish your goals?"

109 formerly-incarcerated individuals have been randomly selected by the Center for Guaranteed Income to receive an unconditional, \$600 per month. The pilot will last one year.

The objective of Durham's Excel Pilot Program is to evaluate guaranteed income's effects on recidivism and re-incarceration, employment, economic security and income volatility, as well as physical functioning, mental health, stress and coping, parenting, housing, and interactions with other institutional systems. StepUp Durham is the program administrator for the pilot.

Recidivism Checks

StepUp participants are 4-8x less likely to recidivate or return to prison after completing StepUp programming

StepUp committed to spending more time in prisons and jails, and also forming deeper partnerships with substance abuse recovery and mental health specialists, as nearly 100% of those who did recidivate had challenges in those areas




43 StepUp Kidz earned a total of \$4010 in bonuses through report card grades, helping with household chores, having impactful conversations with parents, playing outside and working on crafts
